Be the change.

As an engaged participant in the Scholarship of Excellence in Teaching, you will join a faculty success cohort of part-time and full-time faculty from all disciplines. In Spring, you will participate in significant reflection, discourse, and research though meetings, events, and weekly Blackboard Discussion Posts in order to create an action plan to enhance one or more of your courses. In Fall, you will implement and assess your action plan through a variety of instruments to ascertain if your goals were fulfilled.

Guide others.

The mentors are former CASE U.S. Professors of the year and winners of the MC Outstanding Faculty Award, both full-time and part-time. Mentors allow one or two participants to observe their teaching at least once during the spring semester and once during the fall semester. The mentor will also meet with a cohort faculty member and provide commentary on areas of strength and areas for growth once in the spring semester and once in the fall semester. In the fall, the focus of the meeting will be on the action or change that the

participant has incorporated in his/her teaching in order to enhance student success.

Engage in excellence.

The participants are faculty--part-time and full-time--from all disciplines who in general demonstrate outstanding promise. They will attend five meetings in the spring and five meetings in the fall. Except for Professional Week, these meetings will take place between 2 and 4:30 p.m. on Friday. In addition, each participant will meet with a mentor at least once in Spring and once in Fall. Participants will receive a total of 1.5 ESH per semester, a total of 3 ESH, for participating in the program.

Multiply your effect.

As a member of an outstanding faculty cohort, you will have the opportunity to share your success strategies, your scholarship of excellence in teaching, with faculty in your units and within and outside your disciplines, through workshops, conferences, and the publication of your scholarship. In this way, you will multiply the effect of your teaching success and multiply the effect of student success.

Be selected. Apply for the cohort.

- 2. Open to full-time and part-time faculty.
- Application includes two essays on teaching strategies and two letters of recommendation: one from the dean and one from the chair.
